

# Adding Relative Clauses

A relative clause is an extra part of a sentence which begins with a relative pronoun to add more information about the subject of the sentence.

It may begin with

Who	Whose	Which	That
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For example:

The shopkeeper, who had blue hair and thick glasses, placed the object in a bag.
